

Dr. Samuel R. Aymer is an Associate Professor of social work at Silberman School of Social Work, Hunter College where he teaches the following courses: Clinical Practice with Individuals, Small Groups and Families and Violence Against Women. He is also the chairperson of the school's clinical practice method sequence. His scholarly and research endeavors center on—the intersection of masculinity, African American men, race, trauma, intimate partner violence, fatherhood and—psychotherapeutic interventions with

diverse populations.

He is the author of Intimate Partner Violence: Clinical Interventions with Partners and Their Children (2022), which brings into focus an ecological and clinical frame for helping partners and their children work through the psychological effects of partner violence. And he has authored many articles on the nexus among race/racism ethnocultural issues and psychotherapeutic processes.

Prior to entering academia, Dr. Aymer worked for several health, mental health, and victim assistance organizations throughout New York City. Dr. Aymer also worked for a variety of child welfare agencies where he developed training modules, seminars and workshops designed to educate clinicians and administrators about trauma, violence, intimate partner abuse, diversity and the lived experiences of Black families affected by the child welfare system. Finally, Dr. Aymer has an MSW and a Ph.D. in clinical social work. He conducts workshops and lectures on family violence, trauma, African-American lifestyle issues, cross-cultural counseling, and diversity. He maintains a private practice in New York City.
